Tribute to a Local Woman Given Over Radio by Daughter

The following tribute to her mother, Mrs. Ella Calkins, was given by Constance Calkins, wife of Rev. Dr. W. B. D. D. at the Mother's Day program, a half through several weeks have elapsed since the composition was read. The Review is printing it this week because of reader interest in the mother and daughter. Mrs. Calkins lives at 314 E. Liberty street, Barrington. Mrs. Forde attended school in Barrington and was graduated from the local high school in 1921.

To Mothers Mothers are different, I suppose. But there's one thing you can always count on, and that's a mother's love. My mother is gentle—I can't recall her ever raising her voice. Dad always took care of the discipline in our family. But mother was the one who ran to when we had a pinched finger or a hurt head. My mother was an Icelander—she came to America with her parents when she was a little girl of five, along with eleven brothers and sisters. Before she left, the Bishop's wife made her a little velvet coat for the journey because the Bishop's wife was her godmother. And mamma was named after her. It was a long name, and a very fancy one, and I always love to tell it—It's Anna Yonzena Elleborg Bjartnes. Well, when the family settled down in Milwaukee things didn't go so well. Grandfather had a store, but he didn't understand American ways, and pretty soon they had to have a big clearance sale. Mother remembers a long piece of pink velvet which was left over in the sale—I think they made dresses of it, but I'm not sure. Mother grew up in Milwaukee, and one day she went to a Sunday school picnic with her young man, and when they arrived, they met the young man's friend Judd and HIS girl, and well—the way mother tells the story, Judd took the tin-ware, rope and lasooed HER, but you know how these girls are. Anyhow, they lived happily together forever after. Judd and Ella, my mother and dad. And when I stop to think of all the things that make mother dear to me—well—it's a job to put them into words. I suppose the traits I most loved are her gentleness and her ever falling refinement—because I'm not always gentle, not always refined. And I can truthfully say that in a crisis or otherwise mother was always a lady. She never used slang. She always kept a sweet temper. She never gossiped. And her religious faith and good life have always been an inspiration to her children. But I believe the things I most loved about mother were the surreptitious nickels sneaked from father's pocket to pay for a movie or an ice cream cone on a cloudy day. And her on, the baskets and boxes of good things to eat or wear that mother brought to me when I was away from home, and probably needing them badly. And every Christmas the little gifts she has

for every child and grandchild in the family—Oh there are a lot of them—Steen-grandchildren is no small Christmas budget. I don't know how she does it—unless it's love—and they say love can do most anything, especially a mother's love for her children. Mother in the garden—Mother on the stairs—Mother by my bedside—Heaven keep her there.

With me through the dark days Besides me in the sun, Watching me through the job That mother's love began.

Teaching me the stitches Smoothing out the seams Taking out the tangles—putting lace around the dreams—

And if at last I make my garment By the pattern she's put down 'Twill be a checkered gingham apron Worn about an angel's gown. —Connie Calkins Forde

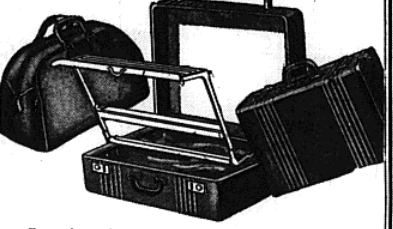

visit. We also met Dr. Jess Sampson who is the surgeon at Cañon and one of the male nurses from there. Both assured us that we would have had no trouble going ashore to visit the leper colony had we only applied to the local officials, but, of course, it was too late by the time we got that information this afternoon.

"Dr. Sampson, who had come to Coron from Cañon for the wedding, told us they had about 6000 patients at the colony; they had 14 physicians in addition to nurses and attendants. People in this vicinity who become seriously ill are treated in the hospital at Cañon. (To be continued next week)
