here it was necessary to work with the natives and show them the value of using fertilizer, and in fact, give them fertilizer at first to show them the improved crops they cut after its use; the company does not own the land on which the cane is grown but contracts for the crop each year and in order to get the most out of their investment in the mill they found it necessary to encourage the natives to grow every stalk of cane their land would produce. The company gives white employees very roomy and beautiful quarters entirely free, has a company hospital and also has a village of at least 100 neat, well-constructed houses for the Filipino employees

which are also given them rent-free.
The municipality here is San Carlos and it is the largest town we have seen so far on the trip; but that is damning it with faint praise, as it is the typical ramshackle, crapulous Filipino town with the foul smelling native market, etc.
