

# Broncho Track Team Points for Conference Meet at Leyden Tuesday

## Warm-up Dual With Lake Forest Here Friday Afternoon

Competition Will Be Keen in 14th Annual Northwest Meeting

The 14th annual Northwest conference track and field meet heads the list of important athletic events for the coming week on the Barrington Broncho's slate. Lake Forest, which is new in track competition in the conference this year, is ranked favorite in the coming meet at Franklin Park Tuesday. Coach Ed Lindenmeyer's thirty clubs have proven themselves worthy of such an honor by their good showings in the Lake county meet and the Palatine Regatta. Arlington and Libertyville also will probably be up among the leaders.

The Bronchos, who have suffered only one defeat so far this season, ought to be good for a number of points. Norm Nestlerode should be good for a couple of points in the dashes. Rice ought to pole vault high enough to place. Collins and Church will probably make a good showing in the javelin as they have done in the past. Herrens has good possibilities in the broad jump as has Saul in the high jump. Then, too, there is always the possibility that a few "dark horses" among the group will pull a surprise.

The Bronks will get a chance to see just how good the Lake Forest bunch really is tomorrow when they meet the Scouts in a dual meet on the local cinder path. Don O'Hara, who has been the Scout's ace performer during past contests, will attempt to click off a few of the standing records out at Northside Park.
