## Miss Greeneisen to Address P.-T.A. at Afternoon Meeting

### Pupils Will Present "Book Parade" and Program of Music

Miss Wanda Greeneisen, director of the Glencoe Farm school, will address the Parent-Teacher association in the school auditorium Tuesday afternoon, Nov. 15, at 2:15 o'clock.

The importance of play and occupation in education will be the theme of her address. Miss Greeneisen comes from a unique school and she has an unusual message for her audience. It was reported.

Mothers of pre-school age children will find her part of the program especially helpful.

A book parade will be given by pupils of the kindergarten and first three grades under the direction of Miss Louise Latrd.

It will include pantomimes of various stories popular with the children.

Among those to be portrayed will be "Sole King Cole" for the kindergarten, "Little Black Sambo" and the Indian story "Little Weaving" by second grade and "Dr. Doollittle" and "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" by pupils in third grade.

The girls' glee club will sing, accompanied by violins and piano, and an accordion solo will be given by Jean Lovendahl.

A display of new books, to be exhibited by the Barrington public library, will conclude the program.

## Complete Armistice Day Programs Here; 20th Anniversary

### Legion Auxiliary Will Give Annual Dinner for Veterans

Programs have been arranged for the celebration of the 20th anniversary of the signing of the Armistice on November 11, 1918, and the general public has been invited to join in the Legion services at the village flag pole Friday morning, Armistice day, at 11 o'clock.

A parade will be formed at the public school building and will march to the downtown park, where the program will be conducted by local patriotic groups.

Rev. W. A. Stauffer will give the invocation and Cecil Paxton will lead the pledge of allegiance to the flag. The school band will play several numbers and the firing of a salute by the Legion brass band will be followed by Paul Pehlman playing "Taps."

About 100 persons are expected to attend the Armistice Day banquet which will be held at Biltmore Country club Friday evening under the auspices of the American Legion Auxiliary. Mrs. Harry Brandt is general chairman of the affair.

As in former years, Legionnaires will be guests of honor. "Doc" Davis has been asked to preside as toastmaster and will call on past commanders of the Legion and past presidents of the Auxiliary for a few words during the dinner hour.

Favors for the party are being made by members of the Auxiliary. Dinner will be served at 4:45 p. m.

There will be musical numbers by the high school orchestra which has been engaged to play for the dancing during the after-dinner hour and by Joan Lovendahl, who will give some accordion solo. There will be cards for those who do not care to dance.

At the public school will observe Armistice day with two programs this afternoon. The first six graders will hold their program in the auditorium starting at 1:15 and the junior and senior high schools will meet at 2:15.

The programs will open with the posting of colors by scouts under the direction of R. W. Wilmering and the pledge of allegiance. Mrs. C. R. Drummel will tell a story to the younger group at its program earlier.

Rev. George T. NeSmith is the speaker for the junior and senior high school program, which will also consist of the "Gottsbay Address" by Richard Watson, tribute to the unknown soldier by the high school chorus, and the playing of "Taps" by Paul Pohlman, and a vocal selection by Lovell Laurenfort.

## Republicans Roll Up Big Majority in Barrington Region

### Sweep Lake County; Poll Heavy Vote for Church, Kelsey, Lyons

Following the trend of 1938, voters of the Barrington-Laurel-Zurich district registered heavy gains Tuesday for the republican candidates whose names were on the official ballot.

In Barrington township republicans led the democratic nearly 3 to 1 in straight votes cast. There were 703 straight republican ballots and 248 democratic out of 1283 votes cast.

In Cuba township, the republicans, pacting the election of H. D. Kelley for state representative, polled 734 straight ballots against 156, nearly 5 to 1. The contest was closer in Ela township where the republicans polled 400 straight ballots compared to 186, about 2 to 1. The total vote in Cuba township was 1181 and in Ela township 786.

In Wheeling and Palestine townships the margin of straight ballots was reduced to less than 2 to 1 by the democrats while in Elk Grove and Schaumburg townships it was slightly more than 2 to 1.

Although the entire state ticket was defeated, the republicans in this vicinity made a strong showing.

The election of H. D. Kelley was assured, and what was prophesied to be a strong contest between Republican Ralph E. Church

## Arrange Programs for Open House at School This Week

### Outline Meeting for Public Tuesday; Alumni Will Meet Wednesday

Plans have been completed for the public open house programs at the public school building Tuesday night and for the special alumni gathering Wednesday night. Both programs will start at 8 o'clock and will be held in the school auditorium.

Following the programs, the public will be invited to tour the building, particularly the new south wing which was completed this past summer.

A dinner for members of boards of education since the school district was organized will precede the open house Tuesday night. At the dinner, which will be prepared and served by the home economics classes, the meeting will be held in the auditorium.

A. D. Church, president of the board, will preside over Tuesday night's meeting and P. Anderson, who ended his second term last spring, will speak on "Need for Our Present Addition." Mr. Church will speak on "What We Have Now."

Charles E. Miner, state administrator of the WPA, which financed part of the construction costs, will follow Mr. Anderson's speech.

## Depressed by Loss of Barn by Fire, Farmer Ends Life

### Anton Hudek, 57, Commits Act in Garage Tuesday; Rites Friday

Dependent over the loss of his dairy barn, which was destroyed by fire Saturday night, Anton Hudek, 57-year-old Cuba township farmer, committed suicide by hanging himself in his garage Tuesday afternoon while members of his family were away.

His body was discovered by a son, Ludwig Hudek who entered the garage to store a sack of soil.

Testimony presented at a coroner's inquest conducted Wednesday morning by Dr. John L. Taylor at the funeral home, 121 N. Elm street, revealed that Mr. Hudek had been considerably depressed by the financial loss of his farm burning. Ludwig and his brother Joseph Hudek, who operated the farm with their father, and Joseph Pierick, a neighbor who with his wife and some friends had visited the farm shortly before the accident, testified at the inquest concerning his mental attitude.

A note, containing instructions for his funeral, was found near the body. A verdict of death by hanging while dependent over financial loss was returned by the jury.

The large dairy barn on the Hudek farm was destroyed by fire late Saturday afternoon. The farm

## Post Office and Bank to Observe Holiday

### Friday, Nov. 11, Armistice Day, Being a National Holiday, It Will Be Observed as such by the Barrington Post Office, L. B. Paddock, Postmaster Announced This Week

There will be no city or rural delivery on this day, but window service for delivery of mail and stamp purchases will be given from 9 to 10 a. m., and the post office lobby will be open all day for deposit of mail and for the convenience of boxholders.

There will be two dispatches of mail during the day at 8 a. m. and 2:45 p. m. Collection will be made at all boxes prior to the morning dispatch, but there will be no collection from boxes in the residential section in the afternoon.

The First National Bank will also be closed in observance of the national holiday.
