gram, high school boys and girls will act as guides in showing visitors through the building.

The program Wednesday night is designed primarily for the alumni members. Persons whose classes represented certain periods or changes in the school history will give short talks. Arnett C. Lucas, member of the school board, will talk on "The Old Frame Building," and give a short historical sketch of the growth of the school from its first frame structure. The first school building stood at the sight of the present Catlow theatre in the 1850's and was later sold for \$200.

Mrs. Alta Bennett will give reminiscences of the starting of the first four-year courses in the high school and Edwin Plagge will attempt to round up members of the first boys' chorus in the school. Lovell Bennett is to recount the history of the first baseball team and H. D. Kelsey will tell of the school's activities when this country was engaged in the World War. Edward Gieske and Harry H. Westover will tell of the first football team here and Jack Sheppard will talk on the present high school. Harry Wiedenbeck, alumni president, will preside.

Following the program, there is to be a tour of inspection followed by refreshments in the cafeteria.

Pheasant Season Is Opened Today; Will Close November 15

The annual battle of hunters versus the pheasants got underway today, Nov. 10, and will continue until November 15. As in previous years, hunters are only permitted to shoot two cock pheasants each day and are only allowed to have six birds in their possession at any time during the season. Several years ago the number of pheasants in the area was so numerous but since the state game department introduced a plan whereby constables no longer get half of the fines assessed, the number of arrests and convictions has dropped sharply.

The reduction in the number of arrests, may be laid also to the fact that most farmers and estate owners have their land well posted.
