

Kirsten Flagstad, Lily Pons on Opera Programs, Chicago

Will Appear in City Opera Presentations Nov. 21, 24 and 25

Two performances each by Kirsten Flagstad and Lily Pons, and one of the important revivals of the season will be features of the fourth week of the Chicago City Opera company. An additional program on Tuesday night, Nov. 22, will make the total number of operas seven for this week instead of the customary six performances.

The schedule follows: Monday, Nov. 21—Kirsten Flagstad will appear as "Elsa" in "Lohengrin" with Eleanor LeMance, Rene Malton, and George Casplick. This will mark the debut of Edwin McArthur, Madame Flagstad's accompanist, as conductor of opera. Mr. McArthur has been accompanist for Madame Flagstad during all her concert tours of this country and has conducted orchestras which accompanied her at various concerts in America and Australia.

Tuesday, Nov. 22, will be an interesting evening of both opera and ballet. The Littlefield Ballet will present a full program consisting of "Parable in Blue" by Gaboritz, the world premiere of "Ladies Better Dressed" by Kingsley, "Let the Righteous Be Glad" to music of severe spiritism, and divertissements. The opera of the evening will be "Cavalleria Rusticana" featuring Duolina Giannini and John Fane-Gasser.

Lily Pons will make her first appearance of the 1933 season Wednesday, Nov. 23 as "Lucia" in "Lucia di Lammermoor" with Louisa Hoe, Galliano Masini, Carlo Morcell, and Virgilio Lazzari. Roberto Moranzoni will conduct.

The board of education series on Thursday, Nov. 24 will present "Carmen" with Duolina Giannini, Armand Tokiyam, Jean Pardali, and Douglas Beattie. The conductor will be Louis Hasselmanns. "Tristan and Isolde" with Kirsten Flagstad making her second appearance of the week will be presented Friday, Nov. 25. Singing with Madame Flagstad will be Hertha Glantz, Paul Althouse, and George Casplick. Henry Weber will conduct.

One of the season's most important revivals, "Andre Chénier," will be presented at the Saturday matinee November 26. Ross Bampton, who has raised her voice from contralto this season, and promises to be one of the foremost sopranos of the year, will appear as

"Madeline." Other stars of the production will be Mari Barova, Beniamino Gigli, and Carlo Morcell. Roberto Moranzoni will conduct. The "Barber of Seville" with Lily Pons as Rosina; will be given Saturday evening. Appearing with Miss Pons will be Ada Paggi Charles Hackett, Victorio Treviani, George Casplick and Virgilio Lazzari. The conductor will be Roberto Moranzoni.

- DELICIOUS FRUIT CAKE**
 3 cups sugar (1 white, 2 brown)
 3 cups sweet apple sauce.
 2 lbs. English walnuts; 2 boxes dates, stoned and cut fine.
 2 1/2 cups sweet cherries (1 red and 1 green). Use juice of the green ones.
 1 1/2 cup citron.
 1 box raisins.
 1 lb. butter.
 About 6 cups flour.
 1 teaspoon soda in powder.
 1 teaspoon baking powder in flour.
 1 teaspoon each: cloves, allspice, nutmeg, in flour.
 Roll fruit and nuts in flour before adding to mixture. Leave nuts and fruit whole. Bake two hours. Makes three nice sized cakes.
 Oven temperature—about 350°.

- QUICK COFFEE CAKE**
 1 cup sugar.
 1 tablespoon lard or butter.
 1 egg.
 1 cup sour milk.
 1/4 teaspoon soda.
 1/4 teaspoon salt.
 1 teaspoon baking powder.
 2 cups flour.
 Combine and mix well. Spread top with sugar and cinnamon. Bake in moderate oven. Bake from 20 to 25 minutes.

- CHERRY RELISH**
 1 qt. cranberries.
 2 apples (with skin).
 2 whole oranges.
 Grind together in food chopper.
 2 cups sugar—mix well.
 Make this the day before using, and it will be nice and red.

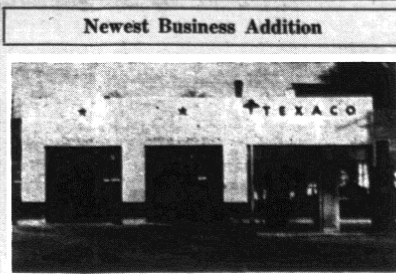
