

Cuba Republicans Listen to Lyons Talk Over Radio

A half hour broadcast of Dick Lyons speech given at the Coliseum was a feature of the Cuba town republican meeting held in the Schroeder building Tuesday night. The well attended gathering tuned in on the speech at 9:45 p. m. and listened until the speech went off the air at 10:15 o'clock.

the court including the one for clerk in which democratic runner-up was named to be the winner over Lew Hendee.

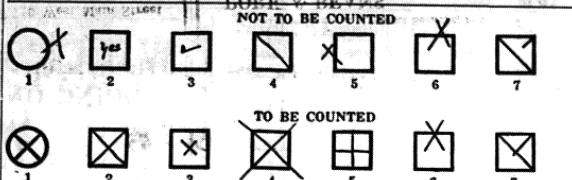

RIGHT and WRONG Way to Mark Ballot



If you do not mark your ballot correctly it will not be counted. In every election many ballots are "thrown out"—that is, not counted—because voters were either careless in marking them or did not know how they should be marked. Michael J. Flynn, county clerk has issued these diagrams showing the right way and the wrong way of marking.

Judges of election are required to "throw out" any ballot marked as shown in the TOP ROW of diagrams.

Ballots marked as shown in the LOWER ROW of diagrams are according to law and must be counted by the judges of election.

It is very simple. Use the "X" mark only, and keep it within the party circle at top of ballot, or in the case of the "TOP ROW" of candidates.

Election Tuesday, November 8. Polls opened at 6 a.m. and close 5 p.m.

Proud Groom in Hungary Gets Engagement Gifts

In the region of Mezőkovác, about eighty miles from Budapest, Hungary, the prospective groom, not the bride, fares the better when a couple becomes engaged. For the happy occasion the girl presents her fiancé with a beautiful shirt, elaborately embroidered in red and blue, a black "engagement apron," also heavily embroidered, two plates loaded with a roast duck, a stuffed chicken, a tart, cigarettes, apples, nuts and gingerbread.

Nor is this all. She is even expected to give the young man 40 to 50 pengo, or about ten dollars, with which he treats all his friends to a bachelor party. The bride does not receive presents from her fiancé until the wedding, when he gives her a pair of shoes, a silk kerchief and the wedding ring.

Engagements in this section last one to two months, and in old times the wedding was a three-week affair, but later it was shortened to a mere day. The ceremony is one of the most picturesque travelers see in all Hungary, for the families of the couple turn out in their finest costumes. An inevitable part of the ceremony is the sobbing of the bride, if she does not weep loudly, it is considered very bad form indeed.

Speed of Large Rivers Depends Much on Depth

Most large rivers travel at only walking speed, rivers usually have their sources on very high ground, their velocity is greatest at the beginning of their course, which is for many days a succession of rapids and waterfalls.

The velocity of falls, which is often enormous, cannot very well be included in any estimate of the velocity of rivers, although the impetus given by rapids, as well as the general inclination of the bed of the stream, has a most important influence on the rate of its current.

But the velocity of a river does not altogether depend on the slope of its bed. Much is owing to its depth and volume, says an authority in the Cleveland Plain Dealer. Most rivers, therefore, flow with varying velocity at different seasons of the year. Furthermore, bends in the course, jutting peats of rock, or other obstacles, interfere with its speed, so that the water of a river flows at different velocities at different parts of its bed; it moves slower at the bottom than at the surface and at the sides than at the middle.

There is no stream which has a regular current of 20 miles an hour, or even 25 miles an hour. The lower Amazon flows at a rate of three miles an hour. The Mississippi, in its lower course, has a velocity of about three and a half miles an hour. The Congo has for many miles above its mouth a current of about seven miles an hour, the impetus of its great falls extending for a great distance below them. The Nile, similarly influenced, moves for a long distance at nine miles an hour.

Probably the most rapid river in the world, with the exception of some small streams which are nearly torrents or cataracts, is the River Rhone, in France. At some seasons the current of this stream reaches a speed of 40 miles an hour. In the dryer season, however, it drops to a rate of six miles an hour.

Postpones Auction Sale of Palatine First State Bank

Federal Judge Sullivan this week postponed the auction sale of the First State Bank building in Palatine in order to allow creditors additional time to obtain pledges for work on the building. To-date there has been a bid of \$9000 made for the property, entered by W. Kehe of Palatine.

Since the first auction last summer, creditors have interested themselves in the sale of the building and are attempting to bid it in. A first in the legal handling of the sale first caused Judge Sullivan to order a second one.

Arabs First Recognized Strength of Gibraltar

Even in the days when military science was in its infancy the Rock of Gibraltar, resting sheer from the Mediterranean to a height of 1,400 feet, appealed to the imagination of the ancients, who called it, together with its companion, Ceuta, on the African coast, the Pillars of Hercules. In all other respects they left the solitary giant alone to his meditation, observes a writer in the Los Angeles Times.

The Arabs were the first to recognize the rock's strategic value. As Moors they crossed the strait in 711, christening it Gebel-el-Tarik, or the mountain of Tarik, their leader's name. They constructed a castle, which is standing, and eventually conquered the whole peninsula.

Nine hundred years later the last Moor was expelled from Spain, and he left it where the original one had landed, in the Bay of Gibraltar.

On the decline of the Spanish empire, the rock passed into British hands.

Napoleon tried to take it when he was building his empire but failed. This is what created the phrase "as strong as the Rock of Gibraltar."

Odd Relationship

An odd relationship existed between Peter Tchakovsky, the Russian composer, and his patron, Wladimir Mekh, a wealthy widow from 1877 to 1880. On condition that they never meet, she gave him, during these years, sums of money which total about \$75,000, notes a correspondent in Collier's Weekly. The agreement was never violated, although they lived close by, passed each other on the street and wrote each other love letters several times a week.
