

# Calvin Luce, 30, Is Fatally Injured in Car Crash Thursday

## Elia Township Man Dies Friday; Funeral Services Held Here Monday

Last files for Calvin Luce, 30-year-old resident of Elia township, who died Friday in Palatine Community hospital of injuries received in an automobile crash Thursday evening at the intersection of U. S. Route 15 (Rand road) and route 53, were held at the funeral home, 149 W. Main street, Monday afternoon. Rev. J. Newcomb of Chicago officiated and burial was in Randall Park cemetery in Wheeling township.

Luce died of a fractured skull, incised brain and shock. It was reported at a coroner's inquest conducted here Friday. Verdict of accidental death was voted by the jury.

The Elia township man lived on Rand road. He was returning home from his work with Kafka Roofing Co. of Cicero when the crash occurred. Driver of the other car was Emil Danco, 1435 N. Drake avenue, Chicago. Luce was going north on route 12 and Danco was going south on route 53, testimony at the inquest revealed. The cars collided nearly head-on.

Robert Fletcher, 8011 Prairie avenue, Chicago, a passenger in Danco's car, received multiple lacerations about the head while Danco escaped with lesser injuries.

The men were removed to the Palatine hospital by the Cook county sheriff's squad. Mr. Duce, who was born December 27, 1907, at Flint, Mich., is survived by his widow, Charlotte Luce, a son Calvin Jr., seven years old, and several brothers and sisters.
