

Improved Broncho Team Loses Grid Contest to Niles Center, 12 to 6

Arlington Heights Is Next Opponent for Local Eleven

Eby, Trojan Right Half Back, Is Star of Game Here Saturday

In the most exciting game of the 1933 football season, the Barrington Bronchos lost a hard fought battle at Northside park Saturday to the Niles Center Trojans, 12-6. In the second half, and especially the last quarter, the Bronchos exhibited drive and aggressiveness that had not been shown all season.

In spite of Shepard's consistent running plays and Church's beautiful kicking, the real star of the game was the Trojan right half back, Eby, who, passed, kicked and ran in great style. The climax came early in the third quarter, when, with Niles having their ball on their own 21 yard line, Eby started around left end and then cut down the center of the field dodging past the whole Barrington team and running 75 yards for Niles' second touchdown of the game.

The first half of the game was uneventful until the last two minutes of play. Before this the ball stayed pretty much between the 20 yard lines. But with the half almost ended, Church fumbled latered from Herren, and Niles Center recovered the ball on the Barrington's 5 yard line. Then Eby threw an incomplete pass over the goal, but on the next play Heister passed over right end to Eby for a touchdown. The drop kick for the extra point was unsuccessful. The half ended after the kickoff.

Early in the third quarter, Eby made his spectacular 75 yard touchdown run. The try for extra point failed. Several plays later Church made a beautiful quick kick from back in his territory which went over the head of the Trojan safety man. The safety fumbled and Wilkins recovered for Barrington on the Niles' 19 yard line. On a series of running plays, Shepard carried the ball to the 2 yard line, but Herren was stopped on fourth down, giving the ball to the Niles team which promptly kicked out of danger.

Pony Football Team Loses Game to Lake Forest Monday, 7-6

On Monday afternoon, in the second game of the season, the Barrington lightweight football team lost a close battle to the Lake Forest eleven, 7-6. The game was evenly played, but the ball changed hands often because of the great number of fumbles. The Ponies' plays clicked better than in the first game, but there is still room for plenty of improvement.

The Barrington touchdown was set up at the beginning of the game, when Long returned Lake Forest's kickoff to its own 25 yard line. Lake Forest took possession of the ball, but Egan returned their punt to the 13 yard line. Then Meyers and Long carried the ball on several plays to the 1 yard line. On the next play Long carried the ball over the goal for a touchdown. The try for the extra point failed. This failure to convert later proved to be the difference between a tie game and a defeat.

Thn, early in the third quarter, Lake Forest got the ball on downs on its own 25 yard line. On the next play, Lake Forest's star left half back, darted through the center of the line, and ran down the field for a touchdown. In the try for placement, the ball sailed right over the cross bar, putting Lake Forest into the lead, 7-6. From this point to the end of the game neither team came near scoring.

Motorists were informed that if they apply for drivers' license at the same time they send in for their state auto license plates, they must enclose separate money orders for the two fees. If several members of the same family are applying for drivers' licenses at the same time, one money order may be sent to cover the entire amount. The fee will be 50 cents for driver's license and 25 cents for drivers under 18. Prior to May 1, no examination will be required of drivers except where qualifications to drive are questioned.
