Orders for Buicks Highest in 10 Years
Flint, Mich., Oct. 18.—Retail orders in the hands of Buick dealers are the highest they have been for any announcement period in the last ten years, W. F. Hufstader, general sales manager, announced today.
The executive said that a telegraphic report covering a cross-section of the dealer organization reveals that in all instances, dealers have more orders on hand for 1939 cars than they had for the new models at this time a year ago and that in many instances, dealers already have booked more business than they had through the first half of the 1938 model year.
Domestic retail deliveries of new Buick cars during the last 10 days of September, which were predominantly early deliveries of 1937 models, totaled 1,627 cars, he said, compared with 1745 in the previous ten days and with 4,438 in the corresponding period of September last year. Sales during the last ten days of August were 2,052.
The final September period showed a gain of 2,004 or 45.9 per cent units over the corresponding period last month and 251 units or 16.3 per cent over the last 10 days of September, 1937.
"With public announcement of the new cars now under way in dealers' showrooms throughout the country, added impetus is being given to the sales momentum already under way," Mr. Hufstader said. "Buick dealers this year are in a splendid position to do business."

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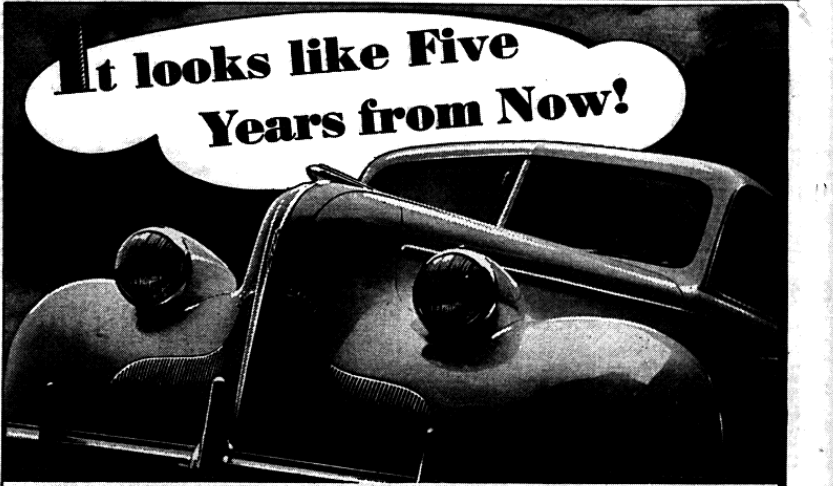
