

"Hold That Co-Ed" Coming to Catlow Sunday, Monday

"Marie Antoinette" to Begin
Run Tonight; "Sing You
Sinners" Billed

Director W. S. Van Dyke II gave the order that set two new records in the history of motion pictures. He requested 5500 men and women and 10,000 18th century weapons—all to be used in one scene of "Marie Antoinette," which is being shown at the Catlow theatre beginning Thursday for three days.

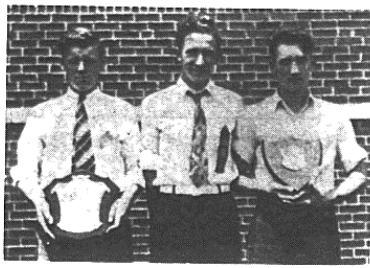

The train was enroute from Lake Geneva to Chicago and carried about 60 passengers, about 20 of whom received injuries of minor degree when the engine and tender left the tracks, derailing several coaches. A small fire broke out at the front vestibule of the first coach but was quickly extinguished by the McHenry fire department.

Crew members found that an open switch had been locked in that position at the point of the accident and railroad detectives and county authorities were notified immediately. They are of the opinion that the wreck was deliberately planned.
