

Heart Attack Fatal to R. O. Gerlach On Way to His Office

R. O. Gerlach of Chicago, owner of the old Charles Eggert farm on Algonquin road for the past 20 years, died suddenly in his car Wednesday morning while on his way to his business office from his home at 4451 Wrightwood avenue.

Before losing consciousness, Mr. Gerlach applied the brakes, slowing his automobile so that it barely nudged the car in front of him.

Heart trouble was reported to be the cause of death. Funeral services will be held in Chicago Saturday.
