Firemen Battle 2 Hours Before Fire Is Extinguished

Unable to Determine Origin; Three Youth Discover Flames

Barrington, Illinois, battled the fire in the Barrington Park Club Co. building at 113 N. Howard street for two hours Wednesday night before they were able to bring it under control and save a major property destruction. The fire was estimated at \$2000 following an inspection made this morning by John Woodworth and the fire department of the township. The cause of the fire was not determined.

The fire was first seen by three boys from Park. William, Fred and Paul. They were playing in the yard at 11:30 p.m. They noticed smoke coming from the building and ran to the front door. They found the door open and saw flames coming from the building. They ran to the street and called the fire department.

The fire was confined mostly to the west side of the building and did not spread to the east side. The fire was extinguished at 1:30 a.m. The damage was estimated at \$2000. The cause of the fire is still unknown.

Why Bills Were Called
'Continental Currency'
Continental Currency Corporation during the Revolutionary war period of 1776-1781, issued bills of credit in the amount of \$2,000,000, authorized by authority of the Continental Congress from June 30, 1776, to November 30, 1778. In all this amount \$1,000,000 was in gold and silver dollars, or the value thereof in gold or silver, and the other \$1,000,000, recalls a writer in the Chicago Tribune.

The bills were promises to pay based on the pledge of congress to redeem them in Spanish milled dollars, or the value thereof in gold or silver, at the rate for their redemption. The reason for their issuance was that the congress had no fiscal power and no authority to levy taxes. There was, however, no sound faith in the prosperity of the Revolution, which was successful for the congress to be able to borrow much money.

The notes, being unsecured by any real value, quickly depreciated, and at the beginning of 1779 they were able to pass for only one-eighth of their face. At the end of the year their rate in specie was \$1 to 1.

In 1790, the congress then recognized the inability to maintain their value and provided that they should be paid in specie at the rate of \$1 to 1, and in 1791, by the terms of a funding act of that year, provision was made for redeeming them, up to a certain date, at that ratio. Those which were unredeemed were thereafter without value and no longer circulated.

Revered for Security Interest
A microscopical analysis revealed the amount of 1779, due to a single issue, will hold the record for the amount of interest paid on a security, according to Collier's Weekly. When these funds mature, the interest, during their 70-year term, will have totaled \$99,000,000, or 10 times the principal of \$9,900,000.
