

Suburban Building Makes Gains to Offset Earlier Drop in 1932

New building in the Chicago region, comprising 211 new homes, reported construction increased so greatly in the second half of 1932 as to recover over two million dollars of the six million decline shown in the first half of 1932, according to the survey released this week by Greenbaum & Rose, real estate men. The total for the first nine months of 1932 was \$12,546,811; for 1931, a falling off of \$1,722,000. December had the second half month but in the second half of 1931 showed an increase over the corresponding month of 1932. The total for the last six months of 1932 was \$4,818,824 and for the same period of 1931 \$3,100,000. December had the largest gain of the year, the increase being 100 per cent. The amounting in 1932 to \$2,846,942 and in 1931 to \$2,111,004.

Home building, however, returned to conditions in excess of the same amount as did those which included an all types of building, with an increase in the first half of 1932 and of strong come-back in the second half. The figures have had the greatest gain of any month over the corresponding month of 1931. The reports show 211 new homes started in December 1932 to compare an estimated 11,227 in December 1931 and in December 1930 14,818 and for the same period of 1931 11,717. December had the largest gain of the year, the upward turn being indicated in July of this year, since when every

1933 Corn Payment Will Amount to 15c

The 1933 AAA program, states Carl Bornert, chairman of the County Alliance corn millers, "makes provision that a payment of 8c per bushel should be given for corn in 1933. In addition to this 8c per bushel should be given for each bushel more if their farm is in full compliance. Recently all the farmers in the county received their allotment. If there are any questions about these allotments farmers they should be corrected. If any changes are made in the allotment they will be additions rather than subtractions from the former given.

"We believe the program has benefited in 1932. We have seen four dollars out at a very satisfactory price and gradually work up to about 56c per bushel. We have no doubt that it would have been impossible to have reached this figure had not the farmers in the program asked their city or town in crisis, we believe the success of the 1933 program will be determined, in a measure, whether farmers can successfully control their expenses and avoid reduction.

"It is proposed, a little later on to build district meetings in various parts of the county to explain the program and to go over the allotment for each farmer. One point we wish to make is this: It is not our job to see that the allotment is paid in being sold what he must plant in 1933. These statements
