

Cooperative Credit Association Plans Meeting February 9

An attendance of about 500 is expected at the annual stockholders' meeting of the Lotus Credit Association, which will be held at the Legion hall at Woodstock on February 9. H. McConnell, president of the association, stated this week.

Former members and their wives from Lake, Boone and Military associations, the area served by this association, will hear reports on the progress of this farmers' cooperative short-term credit organization, which is one of the 11 such associations in the state. Secretary-Treasurer Vincent M. H. Wray will report on the income and expense statement for the year.

Two directors will be elected to succeed the board. The board of five directors consists of former-members living and farmers in the association's territory, who manage the affairs of the organization.

Library News

Book on current problems fill details need for information on world affairs today. The following books in the library will be found very helpful:

Conrad, Kenneth M. "Tides on the World" in writes appealingly for high school students, showing them the problems that must be solved in the future. It is a readable, clear explanation and outline of present world movements, partly based on a cross-section of world events during the recent past. His business, war settlements, the new deal, democracy, cooperative, socialism are among the subjects discussed.

Lockhart, Bruce. "Guns or Butter" gives a first hand picture of "things as they are." When, early last year, Mr. Lockhart started on a pilgrimage through Europe, he thought he would experience there. When he hit Hitler's Germany, he was in Prussia, then to Czechoslovakia, and Berlin, where doors were opened freely to him. The book is written clearly, and will hold the attention of the reader throughout.

Bessinger, Julia G. "The Woman Who Could Not Die" is the story of the author's experience as a prisoner of war in Germany. All of the life of the woman during her imprisonment is related in an absorbing manner.

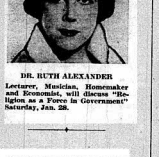

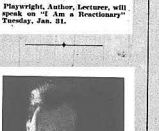

Polish Mountains Once Haunt of Queen Animals
There is one place in a grimacing, skeletal world where true believers can suffer can visit a dragon's cave. The cavern is located in Poland, deep in the foothills of the Tatras, the Arctophila of Cracow. The entrance is at the top of the hill, but the cavern goes well below the level of the Vistula river, which sweeps around the base of the mount.

A long flight of steps winds downward through a shaft lined with crystalline rock. At the bottom there are guards to keep visitors from straying off into the grotto and grottoes away from the fabulous creature made to be lived in a labyrinth, all at once the dragons did not die.

The story of the dragons of Cracow dates back a time when the world was a settlement of a few hundred fishermen.
