**POPK LEAF**

1 lb. ham.  
2 lbs. fresh pork, ground.  
1 cup bread crumbs.  
2 eggs.  
1 cup milk.  
Mix well and bake in moderate oven one hour.

**CHEESE HOTFLIP**

2 lb. melted butter.  
2 lb. suet.  
1/4 cup milk.  
1/4 cup onion salt.  
Cook above ingredients over low fire until they begin to thicken. Remove from heat and add 2 lbs. cheese egg yolks. Cool. Roll in flour.

**HOT WATER SPONGE CAKE**

1 cup sugar.

2 eggs.

1/4 cup hot water.

1/4 teaspoon baking powder.

1/4 teaspoon salt.

Beat 2 egg yolks until white colored, adding sugar gradually.

Beat 1 egg white and vanilla. Add sifted dry ingredients and beat 10 min in beaten egg whites. Bake in 2 layers 20 min.
