160-Acre Farm Used to Explain 1939 Farm Program Payments

In response to requests from Cook county farmers, Farm Adm. Charles A. Hughes has furnished The Review with the following information on how the 1939 AAA farm program on a typical 160-acre Cook county farm.

Although methods used in the AAA program are the same as those used to figure payments on Cook county farms, payments will not necessarily be the same on farms of the same size, since payments depend upon the kind of crop raised, the size of the difference between productivity, etc. Mr. Hughes said.

The acreage in the farm average which Mr. Hughes furnished was divided up as follows:
Soybean-cropland—41 acres
corn allotment with 34 1/2 bushels normal yield
160 bushels normal yield
180 bushels normal yield
100 bushels normal yield
100 bushels normal yield

year—the price adjustment or "parity" payment under the agricultural conservation plan. Each of these payments are based on the farm's average allotment and the corn price adjustment. The total price adjustment payment equals 11 cents per bushel, and the conservation payment equals 25 cents per bushel.

Conservation in carrying at the corn payment, the allotment (41.9 acres) is multiplied by the normal yield of 34 1/2 bushels an acre and that sum multiplied by 25 cents a bushel which brings a total wheat payment of \$124.65.

With about the same procedure in the following: acre is multiplied by the normal yield of 180 bushels an acre and that sum multiplied by 11 cents a bushel, which brings a total wheat payment of \$110.00.

On 44 1/2 acres seasonal allotment, which may be planted in such crops as corn, barley, soybeans, etc. the payment is \$110.00.

There are two distinct payments being made on corn and wheat this year—the price adjustment or "parity" payment under the agricultural conservation plan. Each of these payments are based on the farm's average allotment and the corn price adjustment. The total price adjustment payment equals 11 cents per bushel, and the conservation payment equals 25 cents per bushel.

17 per cent making the payment on corn equal to \$1.39 an acre. \$11.31 at 17 per cent equals \$19.37. That figure is multiplied by 41 acres, making a total payment on the general allotment of \$447.87.
