Heights Man Dies in Attempt to Save Boy

Michael Stein, 43 years old, of Arlington Heights, was apprehended by his neighbors when he was seen to the rescue of a 12-year-old neighbor boy who was seriously injured by the gas when he descended into the basement to repair a pump motor Sunday afternoon.

William Morrison, 14 years old, was taken from the well by a second rescuer but also was overpowered. William had descended in a platform in a well pit to the pump motor. His mother, Mrs. Gladis Morrison, who was watching him, saw him fall off in a faint, but failed to reach the platform, also fell below ground level.

Mrs. Beasmer's screams attracted the attention of Stein and he entered the pit to remove the boy but was thrown by means of a rope imported from Iowa. Stein, however, was too heavy to be lifted by the rope.

When the Arlington Heights fire department arrived, Walter Dusen, one of the crew, donned a gas mask and entered the shaft. He took was overcome from poisoning to remove his mother and Stein's bodies by ropes.

The boy and the woman were revived by efforts to save Stein of no avail.

It is believed the well was filled with damp black gas, long known as a destructive hazard in coal mines.
