

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G. O. Fairweather Suggests Plan to Force Tax Payment

Speaks Before County School Boards Meeting in Chicago

"Unless the collection is prepared to enforce tax payments, I am ready to agree with those who say that property owners who do not pay taxes are just robbers." George O. Fairweather of Barrington county, Ill., said before a meeting of the members of Cook county school boards meeting in Chicago early last week.

Mr. Fairweather, who is director of the citizens committee on tax collection, and formerly business manager of the University of Chicago, offered a three-point solution for the problem and said that a senate committee was studying the law which incorporates most of the committee's suggestions.

Points in the solution are: 1. Development of aggressive system of tax collection and establishment of a bureau which

would coordinate tax matters now scattered haphazardly through various agencies. 2. Prevention of further delinquency by making the law an enforceable command. This would enable the person having such a lien to get a return on it without the necessity of any foreclosure on the property. 3. The creation of a class of property owners whose names are in arrears on taxes more than six months could determine to sell at auction and with no deposit of foreclosure sale.

THINK NOTHING OF IT

On Monday, May 23, I attended the dinner given at the Mayflower Hotel in Washington by the American Retail Federation. The principal speaker on the program was the President of the United States. To those business men who mentioned the startling intelligence that one billion dollars will be required this year to pay interest on the public debt of the federal government...

A CHANCE FOR REAL SERVICE

The so-called "monopoly" committee in Washington is currently preparing to turn its attention to another question which is claimed, perhaps many government economists, the committee wonders why the billions of dollars of idle savings in the bank, investment in private enterprises has been so sluggish in this country.

Investors who have money have maintained in answering these surveys that they are not willing to fund to work productively because they fear government action on two fronts: legislation and taxation. The large majority say they are worried over exactly the same thing: the possibility of a business, and just as much concerned about the possibility of future laws and taxes.

If Senator O'Mahoney and his probing colleagues dramatize these facts to the public and official attention, they will perform an invaluable service for the nation. If, however, the real reasons for non-investment are not made clear, the committee will merely add a few more closely-printed dollars as testimony to government's sum total of words without constructive action.

IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION

A congressional committee has concluded an exhaustive study of the social security taxing system and has made several commendable recommendations for changes.

One of the recommendations is that the pay on the government for a social security fund even be increased for the wages are paid. And the present law calls for an increase in that rate next January 1, to be followed by additional increases until the tax reaches 10 per cent.

On this point, the committee has recommended that the 1 per cent rate be "frozen" for the time being, and any increase be postponed until 1943.

This decision is a welcome indication that some congressmen, at least, are becoming aware of the dangers of too heavy taxation, which takes purchasing power out of the hands of the public. It is to be hoped that the house and senate will approve these recommendations, but it is to be hoped even more that revision of the taxing system will not stop there.

The farmer, the industrial worker, the professional man, the businessman are being and will be expected to pay taxes that have been levied to pay the extreme high cost of running the present complicated federal government. Until this tax burden can be lightened, the expense of the government reduced—there is little hope of a real recovery.
