Astronomer Forecasts New 'Expanding' Star

Persons of this generation may live to see a star near the earth "explode" and become brighter than Venus, or even brighter than Jupiter.

Making this suggestion, Milton A. Humason, astronomer of the Carnegie Institution of Washington, pointed out that the only exploding star, or super nova of the bright stars of the sky is Dragon 1907.

"We can expect only one super nova in the galaxy system in several centuries," he said, "and it is obvious that the place for astronomers to look for them is in a nearby galaxy, such as the Virgo cluster, where more than 50 galaxies can be photographed at a single glance."

"It was the spiral nebula NGC 2445 in this cluster that Dr. Edwin Hubble, noted authority on distant galaxies, discovered a super nova last January. Gases shot out from this star at explosive speeds up to nearly 4,000 miles a second. The distance of this star from earth as bright as the entire star system in which it was located.

An ordinary exploding star, nova heretofore, which could be seen in its normal state only with strong telescopes, suddenly became one of the brightest stars of the sky in December, 1864, attracting world notice. But this star is 100 times brighter than the brightest star ever observed in the Andromeda galaxy in 1885.

"If such a super nova should flare up in our galaxy, it would be at the distance of Virgo, which is nine light years more distant than the 200 light years brighter than the sun. It would be 100 times brighter than the sun and 100 times brighter than the sun."

"Possibly this generation may be fortunate enough to witness the appearance of one of these super novae similar to those which occurred in other star systems."

IS A PENALTY THE REMEDY?
Each year the chief of the local fire department has issued a request through the columns of The Review that care and caution be exercised by residents when burning off grass and brush.

Each year, despite the warnings and pleadings of the men who are chiefly interested in furnishing fire protection to our homes at a minimum of expense, there are numerous fires that result in a big bill for salaries.

We can hardly expect the firemen to fight fires, grass or otherwise, without receiving compensation. It reflects a generous spirit that the public here be kept confined so it will not be necessary for them to be called and to have to charge the community for something that could easily be avoided by the use of a better remedy.

There is a problem in knowing when and how the public can be educated to prevent this needless expenditure of money.

The person who calls the department when he feels his property is being endangered by a grass or brush fire is not to be criticized. After all, fire protection is solely for that purpose.

Thus we eliminate one angle to the situation and come next to the person who starts a grass fire. There can be no escaping the fact that full responsibility rests entirely on the individual who starts a fire and then permits it to spread so that a neighbor's property is endangered.

How are we going to make that person responsible for the damage he has done? It would appear feasible and reasonable to have the village ordinance amended so that a person who starts a fire which would be a misdemeanor for one to start a grass or brush fire that results in the department being called, a penalty, covering the cost of the expense to the village, could be included.

We do not take the stand that dead grass should not be burned off. That is all right. But it should only be done when a sufficient amount of persons are on hand to keep it under control, and when a penalty for those who are found to do so can be included.

As far as providing a penalty for those who are responsible for grass fires in the rural area is another matter. Cost of these calls to homes by the fire department is not a problem. If this group feels that a police measure is needed, it might be proposed for the respective town boards to enter the picture.

What good are we accomplishing if we complain of the expenditures of state and federal governments but neglect to remedy leaks in our own community?

Law on THE FARM
'INDIANCES'—To most people, chickens and rats are good examples of nuisances. As a matter of fact, they are not.

Generally, nuisances may be generally defined as anything which unlawfully causes inconvenience, discomfort, injury or damage to the person. Ordinarily, a nuisance of this nature may be included in such a definition.

Also, an individual owner may be held liable to suffer for the case of another. If the case of one would not amount to a public nuisance to the public, but if it caused injury to other people, but it may amount to a nuisance to the individual. An individual is held liable to another if he causes a stream and carries it back up a hill, and then causes it to overflow on the other side of the hill.

The laws referred to in this article are contained in the Illinois Statutes, Chapter 28, Section 466.
