County Treasurer to Divide 1938 Taxes
Lake County Treasurer Gerald R. Lutz announced Friday that a fourth distribution of taxes collected this summer was to be made to 114 taxing bodies in the county by the middle of the week. Appropriately, the taxes were to be distributed to various municipalities, towns, high schools and grade schools and other taxing units. The tax season had a total of \$1,448,895 in current delinquent taxes and payments being made on September 9, but not payment for the first month. Final notices to property owners who have permitted their taxes to be mailed out October 9. They state that the delinquent tax rates will not be levied on or before October 16, the county treasurer is to collect the first installment on the 8-year period after the Johnson act from more than 100 petitioners who took advantage of the act permitting them to pay off the back taxes in 1941 and thereby save penalties and interest.
