"Dust Be My Destiny," Dramatic Hit, Here Sunday and Monday

Forty of Hollywood's most expert figure skaters, evenly divided between men and girls, who recently placed under contract to play their skill before the camera in the screen's newest ice spectacle. But even these simple things are denied them, because the boy is a fugitive from justice, for a murder which he didn't commit. Even when the boy, through his heroism, aids in the capture of a band of notorious bank robbers, the shadow of the law hangs over him. His vindication in the climactic courtroom scene forms a poignant dramatic ending.
