

In the sheep barn we found Clyde Osbahr with his exhibit of Corriedale sheep from the Alchorage farm. He said that the competition had been the stiffest he has encountered but he is glad he has share of ribbons.

During the afternoon we watched the draft horse judging in the main arena. In the Belgian show, the horses shown by H. C. Hornsman, Danville, Sugar Grove Farm, Aurora, and Alameda, and the Artville, made excellent showings.

Seal Sale Chairman Answers Questions Relating to Design

The 1939 Christmas seal, showing an angel with outstretched arms, signifies protection of American homes against tuberculosis.

Mr. Joseph Weller, chairman of the seal sale now in progress in Barrington, explains in answer to inquiries about this year's seal. "Since tuberculosis is an infectious disease," Mrs. Weller states, "it is literally true that no person had no home in 1939 so long as the disease is uncontrolled. In a sense, the annual sale of Christmas seals is a vast, nation-wide mutual benevolence campaign by which every citizen, rich or poor helps obtain protection against the common enemy."

The local seal sale funds help support the Barrington Health Center, an affiliate of the Tuberculosis Institute of Chicago and Cook county. The Institute is associated with the National Tuberculosis association whose affiliates conduct the nationwide Christmas seal campaign.

The idea for the tuberculosis Christmas Seal originated in Denmark in 1909, when Birger Holboell, a children's clerk, thought of it as a means to raise money to care for children sick with the disease. It was introduced to America in 1907 by Miss Emily P. Busell of Wilmington, Delaware, who borrowed the idea from the Danish funds to build a small tuberculosis hospital in her community.
