—Howdy, Farm Friends! The International Live Stock show was everything the advance publicity said it would be. I had the good fortune to attend the show last Thursday with John Johnson, manager of Orville H. Casper's Dorville farm, and Harry Wolfe of D. C. Cowley's Dorville farm.

We spent several hours touring through the horse, cattle, hog and sheep barns looking over the many fine entries in these divisions. It would hardly have been possible to see all of the live stock in one day so we had to divide our time between the judging in the main arena and the livestock in the barns and alleys. We saw to view the exhibits in the hay and grain show.

In the sheep barn we found Clyde Gehardt with his exhibit of Corriedale sheep from the Chicago farm. He said that the competition had been the stiffest he has encountered but he was glad he had his share of ribbons.

During the afternoon we watched the draft horse judging in the main arena. In the Briggs show, the horses shown by H. C. Horne, manager of the Briggs farm, were excellent showmen.
