### Village Trustees Approve Sale of \$170,000 in Bonds

### Money to Be Used to Retire Judgment in Public Benefit Fund

YOUR FARM COLUMN By BILL RUSK

Howdy, Farm Friends: Farmers connected with the Illinois Extension Service have found that crops planted in curved rows on a 100-foot center are better than those planted in straight rows on Illinois sloping field 1939, 1938 and 1937. The fact that the curved rows are more normal over most of the state.

As important as the yield increases may be, the decreases in soil losses by erosion brought about by the contour rows are still more important. The erosion of soil placed in the curved and contoured rows had recorded a fall of 10-16 inches in August with severe rains. No noticeable erosion took place in the straight rows, while having similar soils were marked.

Better field corn ears and barley increases in corn yields have been recorded as a result of contour rows as well as corn and soybeans raised on the Edwardsville project area.

Yield increases were even more noticeable in northern Illinois projects where the rainfall was below normal for the season. The contoured rows cut across the line of flow of run-off water and thus slow down the run-off and causing more of the water to soak to the ground to the benefit of the crop.

Reports indicate no noticeable erosion at the Edwardsville project on Illinois during the worst growing season.

Manure is one of the most valuable assets on the possession of farmers today. Results of many scientific experiments have determined the true value and cents value of this material have been determined on barrow tests. There have a fertility value of from three to four dollars per ton. It is related, either through lack of management or knowledge, that about one-fourth of the one billion dollars worth of the plant food is lost in manure that is wasted each year.
