RIGHTS OF THE PEOPLE

- 1. The right to trial by jury of fellow citizens as protection against political persecution.
2. Freedom to adopt any religion.
3. The privilege of criticizing political servants without danger that such criticism be judged treasonable.
4. The right to elect members of the government is punishable with jail or death.
5. The right to speak any kind of work, wherever one may choose to speak.
6. The right to send, to have, to invest, or to give away one's income, within the limits of reasonable laws.
7. Freedom to assemble in public or private meetings to discuss political affairs or other matters.
8. The right to own property, and to secure protection against confiscation of property.
9. The right to trial by jury of fellow citizens as protection against political persecution.
